

The United Nations General Assembly designated September 9 as the International Day to Protect Education from Attack. This date coincides with the anniversary of the Safe Schools declaration. The resolution to celebrate this day was presented by the State of Qatar and 62 cosponsoring countries. It was held for the first time in 2020. Its purpose is to safeguard the right of children to education. Schools must be safe, protective places for students and teachers.

survived. She became a staunch defender of a right to education. As she believes that her story is not only her own, but of many other girls, she actively advocates for the right to educate for girls and women all around the world, inspiring many young people and leaders.
