Hellen Keller

Keller was an American woman who was born deaf and blind. She was a prominent writer, educator, and activist who advocated for the rights of people with disabilities as well as women's rights and social equality. She was the co-founder of the American Civil Liberties. She was the first deaf-blind person to earn a BA degree.



Nyle DiMarco

DiMarco advocates for children learning sign language at an early age. He participated in the first International Day of Sign Languages in 2018. The Nyle DiMarco Foundation is a non-profit organization that supports organizations, institutions, and individuals working to improve the welfare of deaf persons worldwide. DiMarco and the Foundation are guided by the principle that every

child deserves love and language.
